Light at the Candlestick

The golden lamp stand, also known as the candlestick, was one of the most beautiful pieces of the tabernacle furnishings.

The purpose of the golden candlestick was more than merely to provide light for the priests to move about. It was to reveal. It revealed the table of shewbread, the altar of incense and the cherubim on the linen covering and the vail. The value and the meaning of the other objects in the Holy Place were illuminated by the lamp stand. Perhaps no other object associated with the tabernacle has so much quantity and variety of meaning as does this lamp stand.

Keep the Light Burning


The schedule for servicing the candlestick corresponded to the morning and evening burnt sacrifices on the brazen altar. Every morning, exactly at 9:00 a.m., a priest, in behalf of the whole nation, would kill a lamb as a whole burnt offering. Since evening began at 3:00 p.m., that was the exact time that the afternoon burnt offering of a lamb was also offered on the altar in behalf of the whole nation. These two burnt offerings were offered at this precise time every day of the week.

While the animals were being slain at the altar, another priest would be inside the Holy Place trimming the wicks on the lamps. He would replenish the olive oil in the lamps, and if necessary replace the worn wicks.

The golden candlestick was ornamented as an almond tree with buds, blossoms and almonds.

It represented the resurrection of Christ being the first tree to bud out in the spring.
